#### Context

Unit 2 is the resolution and presentation of your work according to your Project Proposal. A symposium will provide the opportunity to present your research and receive further peer feedback. Your practice at this stage should synthesise your practical, conceptual and professional abilities. You will be expected to consider your future practice, audience and the context of your work in contemporary practice.

The intention and context of your work will inform decisions you will take regarding a final exhibition. You will be expected to work collaboratively with your peers to actively plan, organise and install an exhibition, as part of your continued Personal and Professional Development.

#### **Brief Description/Specification of Task**

At the final exhibition, you will present a resolved body of work based on your project proposal. You are also required to submit a portfolio of your ongoing research, documentation and actual work in progress, a reflective journal and a written paper that analyses and evaluates your work and reflects upon future developments.

#### **Indicative Content**

- Exploration of Practice
- Exhibition Planning and delivery
- Personal and Professional Development

Pathway and course based seminars and tutorials will continue to challenge and engage with your project and practice. The symposium will give you an opportunity to synthesise, evaluate and present your project.

Planning and preparation for the exhibition will be another focus for professional practice, establishing your ability to coordinate and present your masters project.

# Learning Outcomes (and Marking Criteria)

On successful completion of this unit you will be able to:

- Present a resolved body of original creative practice that has evidenced the systematic enhancement of your knowledge and understanding (communication and presentation; technical competence; personal and professional development; subject knowledge; research; experimentation).
- Analyse and critically reflect coherently upon your own practice and its context (research; analysis; personal and professional development).
- Summarise and evaluate your overall progress and formulate a constructive plan for continuing Personal and Professional Development (personal and professional development; collaborative and/or independent professional working).

Summative Assessment evidence must be completed and submitted in order to pass the unit.			

# **Anonymous Marking**

This assessment will <u>not</u> be anonymously marked. This is because the nature of the research-led studio practice requires assessors to be familiar with work developed over the course of the entire unit. The writing component can therefore not be marked anonymously, because the studio practice and critical writing are assessed holistically (see above). This is consistent with the research-led nature of the course.

#### 1. Symposium

This involves giving a 5 minute presentation of your work followed by feedback and discussion.

#### 2. Critical Evaluation

A 500 word post must be added to your blog – see details below – by 4 July 2019 09.00 UK Time

#### 3. Reflective Journal

This is your blog – create a new page called 'Unit 2 Assessment' and provide notes and links to all the assessment evidence required including the 500 word Critical Evaluation post mentioned above by 4 July 2019 09.00 UK Time.

#### 4. Practical Work

Your Practical work for exhibition should all be presented in the exhibition space by **4 July 2019 09.00 UK Time**. This deadline includes physical work in London and any alternative forms of exhibition such as online. Any

	physically submitted work should be labelled with your name, student ID number, pathway and unit number.
